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1. Preliminaries

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1.2 Adoption of agenda

2. Member updates

2.1 AFMA Management Report

12. The MAC noted the written AFMA update provided in the agenda papers noting that on 17 August 2022, a delegate of the Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water approved the ETBF as a WTO until 19 August 2025, subject to 10 conditions under Part 13A (**Table 1**) and 2 conditions under Part 13 (**Table 2**) of the EPBC Act. The MAC also noted a brief update on catches in the ETBF and WTBF as at 23 September 2022.

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- 13. The MAC noted further verbal updates from the AFMA member on the following:
 - a) The Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water (the Department) has released an updated AFMA application for the reassessment of the WTBF as an approved Wildlife Trade Operation (WTO). The updated application corrects inadvertent errors in the bycatch data and ERA information previously supplied. The Department has advised AFMA that due to the additional public consultation process required, a decision on the WTO reassessment may occur several weeks following the lapse of the current WTO approval (11 November 2022). MAC members raised significant concern and disappointment that the WTBF fishery may be left without an export approval given the low risks associated with the fishery. The MAC agreed to notify the AFMA Commission of industry concerns regarding the risk and potential consequence to the fishery. The AFMA member advised that AFMA is working with the Department to ensure all efforts are made minimise the risk of the WTBF being left without approval to export fish caught in the fishery. The MAC noted this and requested to be advised on any progress.
- 14. AFMA, CSIRO and industry have formed a Working Group to provide advice on revisions to the Bycatch rates in fisheries largely driven by variation in individual vessel behaviour nature article:
- 15. The Threat Abatement Plan is due for review in 2023.
- 16. An Invited Participant sought information from AFMA on the proposed CITES Appendix 2 listing of Blue Sharks. AFMA agreed to provide an update to the MAC out-of-session.

ACTION ITEM 1: AFMA to provide TTMAC an update on the proposed CITES Appendix 2 listing of Blue sharks out of session.

ACTION ITEM 2: AFMA to notify the AFMA Commission of industry concerns regarding the WTBF WTO risk and potential consequence to the fishery.

2.2 International Meetings Update

- 17. The MAC noted a verbal report on relevant international meetings from Neil Hughes of the Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry. In relation to the IOTC, he noted:
 - the ITOC interim Yellowfin Tuna measure was reviewed earlier in the year however agreement could not be reached on any revisions. As a result, the interim measure remains in force without change.
 - there is a G16 coastal states meeting in Bangkok next month for coastal state positioning for allocation and another meeting in Kenya next year.
 - the next decision-making IOTC meeting will be in May 2023.
 - the IOTC agreed to a Bigeye management procedure (harvest strategy). The
 management procedure will be used to derive a TAC for the stock commencing in 2024.
 A process for allocating the TAC among members is yet to be agreed but is to be
 progressed external to the management procedure.
- 18. Following the report on the IOTC meetings, Industry members stated the Australian Industry is being unduly disadvantaged under the interim Yellowfin Tuna measure, despite fishing sustainably for the past 20 years. Industry is disappointed that Australia is subject to an ongoing TAC reduction in line with the interim measure, while other members of the IOTC have not supported the measure. Industry further noted that the interim measure was supposed to be for 12 months only, and that Australian catches have not contributed to the decline of the stock.

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19. Mr Hughes also informed the MAC that the next WCPFC meeting will occur in December 2022 in Vietnam.

2.3 Industry and Scientific members Update

- 20. The MAC noted a written update provided by the SBT Invited Participant (Attachment 1) and the following verbal updates from Industry members;
 - The on-going issues of fuel and bait costs are continuing to increase operation costs. An Industry member noted a reduction in bait from 100% squid use historically, to approximately 25% squid use.
 - The decrease in the Japanese YEN value is having a significant effect.
 - Freight costs are still expensive with the ceasing of International Freight Assistance
 Mechanism. This is hindering Industry's ability to export; however, freight costs are slowly
 coming down, this highlights the need for AFMA to progress US import rule procedures to
 ensure Industry can utilise the export market.
 - There are ongoing issues for Industry sourcing and retaining crew. The Industry member noted the fishery is experiencing labour retention issues largely relating to complicated visa application processes. Sourcing international crew and strict visa constraints is both an ETBF and WTBF issue. The MAC heard this has resulted in multiple vessels not being able to go fishing. This may need consideration in the development of the NER policy.
 - Tuna Australia highlighted on-going negotiations with the Commonwealth Government regarding crew sourcing and supporting business as major priorities.
 - The MAC heard the reduction in ability to export due to the high costs has resulted in a reduction in Swordfish targeting within the fishery.
 - The season is starting later into the calendar year than what is usual, reducing the length of the season significantly. This due to a mixture of factors including operational factors.
 - Tuna Australia updated the MAC regarding on-going Tuna Australia research projects.
- 21. The MAC noted a verbal update from the Recreational Member and Invited Participant.
 - The Queensland heavy tackle Marlin season has begun, and bookings are strong with a lot of international interest.
 - The MAC heard an update from the FRDC Shark depredation project and the continuing research being undertaken.
 - The MAC heard the season in NSW finished early mainly due to poor weather conditions.
 The first tournament is scheduled to start in November and a written report will be provided at the next meeting.
 - Fuel costs are hindering the recreational sector.
- 22. The MAC noted a verbal update from the Research Member.
 - The MAC heard that CSIRO is leading a close-kin mark-recapture design study for yellowfin tuna in the IOTC region. The design study is the first step in preparing for the

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implementation of close kin mark-recapture for yellowfin tuna, which will reduce the uncertainty in the assessments for this stock..

3. DISCUSSION AND ADVICE

3.1 ETBF TACCs for 2023 and over/under catch

23. TTMAC was provided with the paper 'Consideration of Total Allowable Commercial Catches (TACCs) for the Eastern Tuna and Billfish Fishery (ETBF)' in the meeting papers. This document outlines the various considerations required in setting TACCs under the ETBF Management Plan.

- 24. The MAC noted that TTRAG 36 met on 13 September 2022 and made recommendations for TACCs for the five quota species to remain unchanged (Table 5) for the 2023 fishing season. TTMAC was provided with the details of these recommendations in the document 'TTRAG Advice for the Eastern Tuna and Billfish Fishery for the 2023 Season' which formed Attachment 3.1a of the meeting papers.
- 25. The MAC received a presentation from the Research Member recapping the process used to arrive at the Modified Swordfish Harvest Strategy which included below.
 - i. A modification to the HS was applied during the extreme under-catch period.
 - ii. Under the revised HS, if the HS recommends a decrease in the RBCC, the following rules apply:
 - If current catches are further below the RBCC than the RBCC is below the current TACC, no change is recommended;
 - If current catches are not further below the RBCC than the RBCC is below the TAC, the residual difference is discounted from the TAC reduction;
 - If the RBCC is below current catches, then the full TAC decrease is applied.
 - No alterations are made in the event of a TAC increase.

The review of the HS will commence 2023 and this extreme under catch period will be considered during the review. MAC members discussed the wording surrounding exceptional circumstances and noted that exceptional circumstances no longer apply to the low catch to TACC ratio as this has been accommodated in the modified HS. MAC members recommended the *no additional* exceptional circumstance have been identified. AFMA to work of documents and wording on futures updates to the Swordfish HS.

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- 26. TTRAG's advice is based on the application of:
 - a) An indicators-based and 'whole of Government position for Bigeye tuna, Yellowfin tuna and Albacore tuna.
 - b) Amendments to the Swordfish Harvest Strategy (HS) which were adopted following the triggering of exceptional circumstances under the Harvest Strategy in 2021. The amendments were assessed through Management Strategy Evaluation (MSE) analysis undertaken by CSIRO. The modified harvest strategy was endorsed by TTRAG and then by TTMAC out of session and has been used for calculating the TACC for Swordfish for 2023. AFMA Management will table the final Modified Harvest Strategy together with TTMAC's TACC recommendations at the AFMA Commission meeting on 9 &10 November 2022.
 - c) A constant catch harvest strategy for Striped Marlin. The constant catch harvest strategy approach was endorsed by TTRAG in July 2022.
- 27. The MAC noted that TTRAG is scheduled to commence a review of the Swordfish HS in 2023.
- 28. The review will include the key inputs to the HS which are the catch data and the standardised Catch Per Unit Effort (CPUE) indices. The CPUE indices are to be reviewed and tested after 3 years of implementation, to assess if the HS is functioning in a manner consistent with the results of the MSE and Commonwealth Fisheries Harvest Strategy Policy 2018 requirements and at the same time providing settings that meet AFMA's objectives and industry's preferences of stability.
- 29. During discussion, Industry Members were concerned that the CPUE standardisation fails to represent all fishing activity accurately. The research member explained how the CPUE standardisation did adjust the nominal CPUE in most years, including recent years when fishing activity has declined. The MAC noted the review process will commence in 2023.
- 30. An Industry Member raised concern about the nominated Swordfish catch weights for WCPFC CMM. The member noted a concern that the wrong weights have been submitted. AFMA noted that they will check the Swordfish catch data for submission to WCPFC.
- 31. There were no further comments from participants regarding the TACC recommendations.

TTMAC noted the recommended TACC's for ETBF quota species for the 2023 fishing season in Table 5 and recommended these TACC's for consideration by the AFMA Commission.

TTMAC supported the recommended overcatch and undercatch of 10% and a determined weight of 2,000kg for all quota species in the ETBF for the 2023 season.

ACTION ITEM 5: AFMA to check the Swordfish catch weights submitted for WCPFC to ensure weights are accurate.

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3.2 WTBF TACCS for 2022/23 and over/under catch

32. The MAC noted the recommended TACCs for WTBF quota species for 2023 fishing season given by the TTRAG in table 6.

- 33. The MAC noted both Striped marlin and Yellowfin tuna are classified by the IOTC as overfished and subject to overfishing. Bigeye tuna is classified as not overfished but subject to overfishing.
- 34. The MAC noted an interim rebuilding plan agreed by the IOTC for the Indian Ocean Yellowfin tuna stock in the IOTC area of competence took effect from 1 January 2022 (Resolution 21/01). The interim rebuilding plan applies to all contracting parties and co-operating non-contracting parties.
- 35. The MAC noted under the plan, Contracting Parties and Cooperating Non-Contracting Parties (CPCs) such as Australia, with a reported catch of yellowfin tuna in 2014 of less than 5000 t and an average catch over the period 2015-2019 below 2000 t then that state should limit their seasonal no more than 2000 t.
- 36. The MAC noted that currently Bigeye tuna has no specific measures to limit catches, however, at the Commission meeting in 2022 the IOTC adopted a management procedure (MP HS) for Bigeye tuna (Resolution 22/03). Under the resolution, the first TAC derived from the MP shall apply in 2024 and 2025.
- 37. The MAC heard that the Industry Members are supportive of Electronic Monitoring use across the region. Industry Members raised concerns the Australian Industry is not on a level playing field with other countries.
- 38. The MAC supported industry involvement in the development of Australia's strategic negotiation position at the regional level.
- 39. The industry member raised concern with the resources allocated to assess the WTBF for 1 fishing vessel and suggested the advice remains the same for a period of 3 years unless significant more fishing effort occurs in the fishery.

TTMAC supported the recommended TACC's for WTBF quota species for the 2023 fishing season in Table 6 and recommend these TACC's for consideration by the AFMA commission.

TTMAC supported the recommendation overcatch and undercatch of 10% and a determined weight of 2,000kg for all quota species in the WTBF for the 2023 season.

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3.3 Proposed Pulse Event Arrangements

- 40. The MAC noted Tuna Australia (TA) has requested management arrangements to be developed and included in the management arrangements booklet to enable real-time decision making to utilise 'pulse' abundance events of stocks in Australian waters in the ETBF.
- 41. The MAC heard this was derived from many events involving different target fish species. However, the 2015/16 season, resulted in higher than usual catch rates of Yellowfin tuna which led to many operators catching all their quota and ceasing fishing before the end of the season.
- 42. The MAC noted that one industry member did not consider this to be a priority for the fishery at this time. The number of boats has reduced significantly in the fishery so there is less risk of the fishery being limited by the TAC.
- 43. The MAC noted that AFMA will create a Working group and report back to the MAC. The working group will meet with the aim of:
 - i. examining the likely nature and extent of pulse abundance events in the ETBF;
 - ii. developing potential management options, outlining any specific decision rules, information (economic and scientific), monitoring and assessment needs to support each option;
 - iii. evaluating each option against legislative and policy obligations; and
 - iv. integrating the preferred option if relevant, into management arrangements for the fishery.

ACTION ITEM 6: AFMA to convene a working group to discuss management possibilities of utilising pulse events within the fishery.

4. Other Business

44. The MAC was presented with a demonstration from Tuna Australia showcasing ongoing FRDC research into flyback rates, causes, and impacts.

5. Date and venue for next meeting

- 45. The MAC decided the next meeting will be in April with the exact details to be decided out of session. This date is to fit in with the RAG meeting dates.
- 46. The Chair thanked all participants and members for their contributions and closed the meeting.

Position on TTMAC: Invited Participant

General Update: Main stock, catch and market developments since the April 2022 Brief for TTMAC.

SBT Stock:

- a. Global SBT stock is now assessed by ABARES (Status Reports), and by AFMA (see www.afma.gov.au) as "not overfished," "no overfishing" taking place and now as "sustainable."
- b. The 2022 CCSBT Scientific Committee report will be released after the October 2022 CCSBT meetings. The 2021 CCSBT stock review (see www.ccsbt.org/ESC) found stock growth continues in line with Harvest Strategy targets. This target, and the quota setting are based solely on a scientific formula (Management Procedure). Quotas are set to achieve B30 (MSY) by 2035. The stock has recovered as follows:

- c. In September 2021, IUCN only downlisted SBT from "critically endangered" to "endangered" despite the above information. In contrast, IUCN downlisted Pacific Bluefin Tuna (PBT) from "endangered" to "near threatened" despite PBT being at less than 5% of virgin Spawning Biomass, and the stock declining (see www.iucn.org/red list).
 - ASBTIA appreciates that the major part of these contradictions is due to the IUCN relying largely on terrestrial life history criteria rather than the stock status and management. However, ASBTIA has formally requested IUCN to review the SBT situation, based on changes in SBT since the IUCN assessment in January 2021.
- d. In October 2021, SBT was included in the list of species to be considered for delisting from the EPBC Act. It is currently listed as Conservation Dependent.

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e. There has been no <u>"overfishing"</u> since 2009, and the SBT stock has continued to increase by 5% pa (Source: CCSBT) since then. As a result, the quotas have increased (in whole tonnes):

Markets: Main issues are:

a. East Coast longliners have done a very good job diversifying markets from Japan to the US, as has Mexico with farmed Pacific Bluefin to the US:

b. Prices in Japan in 2022 are much higher, but this will largely/totally be cancelled

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out by extreme Yen weakness and by much higher transport costs and less availability of transport. For example – the Yen is at the weakest against the \$US for 20 years and against the \$A for 7 years (see Industry Indicators attached).

Other issues

This includes only items which may be relevant to TTMC:

- a. ERS issues: Eight ASBTIA Members participated in the CCSBT ERS Working Group in March 2022. Given the continuing resistance of High Seas and NZ longliners to concrete mitigation packages and compliance measures – we are concerned not just for the seabirds, but also that the CCSBT's legacy is not the great science, but the poor performance on seabirds. The Australian Government did its best at the ERS meeting.
- b. CCSBT Market Study: The CCSBT has contracted another study of the Japanese and other SBT markets, to assess whether there is any overcatch. ASBTIA has made a major submission. This study coincides with prosecutions in Japan for breaches of Pacific Bluefin quotas which one Japanese Government official calls "the tip of the iceberg" see:

- c. EPBC licence renewal: Under Part 13A of the EPBC Act, the current 3-year SBT Export "Licences" expire in December 2022. The Commonwealth advertised widely for submissions on the renewal, but received no submissions.
- d. MSC: ASBTIA is considering the final application for MSC certification of the SBT purse seine fishery in the GAB. The delay is the final publication of the revised MSC Standard in October 2022. ASBTIA has made direct submissions to MSC on their current review of the MSC Standard, and also was part of joint submissions.
- e. Impact of La Nina: Previous La Nina events have been relatively short and moderate compared with the 2021-2023 La Nina now entering its third successive year. Combined with the recovery of the SBT stock, and the weather effect reducing the number of possible fishing days, it has a significant impact on catch, towing and growout.
- f. National Fisheries Plan: ASBTIA welcomes the long-debated clause in the final Plan commitment 9.1:
 - 9.1 "Engaging in international fisheries management through cooperation to protect Australia's access to shared stocks, promotion of sustainable fisheries management and ensuring a level regulatory playing field for Australian operators."
- g. Adoption of the CCSBT Harvest Strategy by other RFMOs: In a PEW virtual on Atlantic Bluefin in September 2022, the EU announced that it would be pushing for the world's largest Bluefin fishery (Atlantic Bluefin see www.iccat.int) to adopt the CCSBT Management Procedure (MP), including the Decision Rule which uses scientific data to set the quota.

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- h. Oil and gas exploration: There is now only one remaining exploration licence in SA-a dormant one granted under the EPBC Act over 15 years ago. However, a consortium has applied to do a 3D survey 2023-2027 on the Victoria/SA border east, and apply for future licences in SA.
- i. Exit of major quota owner from tuna industry: The second largest SBT quota owner, Tonys Tuna International (TTI) has announced its intention to sell all its tuna farming assets. This reflects not just the stock recovery leading to more demand, but also the long supply chain of moving parts in the business. This chain includes getting catch quota, catching the fish, feeding the tuna, the 4-6 month growout before any income, and then selling the tuna from the farms.
- j. Resource sharing: SBT is the only Commonwealth fishery with a formal legislated resource shares based on a major study of the actual shares. The future issues include how the charter/recreational share of 5% of the Australian CCSBT allocation will be allocated/shared between States/regions, administration of the charter/recreational fishery and any cost recovery.
- k. Desalination plants: Climate change is likely to worsen the existing shortage of water on Eyre Peninsula. This means finding sites to build desalination plants at Port Lincoln and near Whyalla. The debate is over the salinity effect in Spencer Gulf, and the impact on fisheries and aquaculture. On the southern plant options the opportunity is to build it to draw and disperse into the GAB, and have a capacity to feed water back into the Murray but it is higher capital cost.
- I. Research: ASBTIA continues with a major farm research program especially in fish health. In-farm mortalities over the 4-6 month growout period are below 0.25% of fish into farms. How to underpin that, how to improve feeds and maintaining a government environmental monitoring program are the major projects.
